Over his 47-year career at IIED, from 1974 to 2021, his advocacy efforts have profoundly impacted urban development and brought attention to the critical issues faced by urban residents globally.

In an incredibly touching gesture, David has dedicated his award to the Care Team at Wimbledon Common Care Home, where he has been a resident since 2022. He said, *"This award is a testament not just to my work but to the incredible support I've received throughout my career. The Care Team here has played a crucial role in my*
